2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

The college, affiliated with Barkatullah University, Bhopal, adheres to the university's regulations for evaluating student performance. These guidelines are clearly communicated to students to maintain transparency. Internal assessments are systematically conducted for theory courses, laboratory work, internships, and projects.
